2. Indigenous Peoples' Day Resolution Passes Unanimously in Phoenix By Amanda Blackhorse

On Wednesday, Phoenix, Arizona, became the largest U.S. city to officially celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day in opposition to Columbus Day. Group members of Phoenician's for Recognition of Indigenous Peoples Day, Jeff Malkoon and Carlos Bravo, created the resolution, which passed unanimously 9 to 0. Malkoon said this has been a two-year effort. Various Native American groups, such as Indigenous People's Day Arizona, the Phoenix Indian Center, and Arizona State University's Indigenous Student group, supported the resolution. Prior to the council meeting, the groups as well as Native community members gathered to show their support.

Laura Medina, Native community member and co-founder of Indigenous Peoples' Day Arizona, addressed the city council. Medina called for the abolishment of Columbus Day, but was met with push back by city councilman Jim Waring. Waring advocated for keeping Columbus Day, but to also celebrate the contributions of Native American people with the passage of Indigenous Peoples' Day.

3. Department of Justice Announces Expansion of Program to Enhance Tribal Access to National Crime Information Databases

The Department of Justice is expanding the Tribal Access Program (TAP) for National Crime Information which provides federally-recognized tribes access to national crime information databases for both civil and criminal purposes. Tribes interested in participating in TAP must submit a letter or resolution from the tribe's governing body by December 2, 2016. TAP allows tribes to more effectively serve and protect their communities by ensuring the exchange of critical data. In the fall of 2015, DOJ selected tribes to participate in the initial User Feedback Phase of TAP. This partnership focused on testing DOJ's technology solution and training support; it also enabled tribes to identify and share best practices regarding the use of national crime information databases to strengthen public safety.

The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) recognizes the unique importance of many protected species to tribes and values ongoing efforts by tribal nations to conserve and protect species under NMFS' jurisdiction. NMFS is authorized to provide Federal assistance to tribes to support conservation programs for marine and anadromous species under its jurisdiction. This assistance, provided in the form of grants, can be used to support conservation of endangered, threatened, and candidate or proposed species, as well as post-delisting monitoring of recovered species. Proposals that address the recovery of one of the following critically

endangered species are encouraged this year and will be considered a priority for funding: Atlantic salmon, white abalone, Cook Inlet beluga whales, Hawaiian monk seals, Pacific leatherback sea turtles, and southern resident killer whales.
