TRIBAL CONSULTATION ANNUAL REPORT July 1, 2018 – June 30, 2019

Agency Overview

The Arizona Department of Child Safety (DCS) is the single state administered child welfare services agency for Arizona whose mission is to successfully engage children and families to ensure safety, strengthen families, and achieve permanency. The DCS vision is that children thrive in family environments free from abuse and neglect.

Tribal Consultation Activities

Consultation and communication between DCS and Tribes are essential, and are especially important in the areas of contracts management, policies and procedures, Inter-Governmental Agreements (IGA), and Indian Child Welfare Act case-related issues. The Tribal consultation activities and performance measures for SFY 2019 for DCS are listed in the following table.
