<i>ADOH recognizes and commits to a government-to-government relationship with Federally recognized tribes.</i>	<i>In an effort to target resources to areas with the greatest need, the ADOH created the Tribal Liaison position to provide technical assistance and outreach to the 22 federally recognized tribes in Arizona.</i>	<i>ADOH acknowledges the unique relationship between the state government and Indian tribes of Arizona. Dealings between ADOH and the Indian tribes of Arizona shall be consistent with the principles of tribal sovereignty as described by federal law.</i>

- a) Identify the challenge(s) encountered by staff in providing services to tribes and/or tribal community members.

Not necessarily a challenge, but ADOH recognizes the great need, and shall maintain the Tribal Liaison position to help build rapport with tribes and maintain open lines of communication with tribal entities and the Department.

In September 2020, ADOH obtained outside counsel to aid in determining oversight and regulatory jurisdiction with regard to manufactured housing and factory built building permitting and installation inspection. ADOH seeks to establish agreements with each tribe to aid in defining the needs of the tribal community as the manufactured structures are placed on tribal land. State law and obligations under the Housing and Urban Development Manufactured Housing Program outline protocol for permitting and installing this product, along with measures taken to ensure consumer protection.

- b) Identify a memorable highlight or learning experience that could benefit other state agencies.
In 2020, the ADOH held a virtual Tribal Qualified Allocation Plan Focus Group (Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program), to offer a more intimate platform to share tribal initiatives and concerns regarding the creation of decent, safe and affordable housing.

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Community Development Block Grant – CARES (CDBG-CV) – The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act of 2020 (CARES Act) provided for a supplemental appropriation of Community Development Block Grants as authorized by the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended. The State of Arizona has received three (3) tranches of CDBG-CV funding (CV1, CV2 and CV3). CV2 and CV3, may be used anywhere, including Tribal Land (with Tribal concurrence, and will be administered by the ADOH. Currently, the ADOH is preparing amendments to its Action Plan concerning receipt of these funds, and seeking public input for its use, as required by Federal Law.
