While the official registration to vote deadline has passed (October 10, 2016) our efforts to increase voting participation in the upcoming elections continues. Shown by major studies to significantly reduce suicidality, the ASIST model teaches effective intervention skills while helping to build suicide prevention networks in the community. ASIST is held over two consecutive days for a total of 15 hours. ASIST has saved and changed hundreds of thousands of lives around the world. The training values participants' experiences and contributions and encourages them to share actively in the learning process. Some parts of ASIST take place with all participants together, and others take place in a smaller work group. This helps create a balance between safety and challenge. Local resources are provided and their availability in the community is discussed. Participants receive a certificate upon completing the workshop.
