The goal of this program is to assist tribes in developing the capacity to administer environmental regulatory programs consistent with federal laws, and to develop and implement solid and hazardous waste programs for Indian lands in accordance with the Solid Waste Disposal Act. This program also provides technical assistance in the development of multimedia programs to address environmental issues on Indian lands.

The Museums for America (MFA) program supports projects that strengthen the ability of an individual museum to serve its public. MFA has three project categories:

**Learning Experiences:** IMLS supports the unique ability of museums to open the door to meaningful knowledge and enhanced inquiry skills for people of all ages and backgrounds through multi-sensory learning, discovery, critical thinking, and problem solving. IMLS welcomes applications for projects that position museums as unique teaching and inquiry-focused institutions within today's formal and informal learning ecosystem. Successful projects will provide high-quality, inclusive educational opportunities that address particular audience needs. We encourage projects that are based upon current research in cognitive and behavioral science as well as best practices developed in museums and other informal learning environments.

**Community Anchors:** IMLS promotes the role of museums as essential partners in addressing the needs of their communities by leveraging their expertise, knowledge, physical space, technology, and other resources to identify and implement solutions. By strengthening museums' capacities for civic engagement, these projects contribute to the creation of livable, sustainable communities. IMLS welcomes applications for projects that empower museums to transform their roles in their communities from being community resources to being community catalysts. Museums have a role to play providing civic and cultural engagement, facilitating lifelong learning, promoting digital inclusion, and supporting economic vitality through programming and services. We envision museums to be highly collaborative, adopt co-creating strategies, and engage with a wide variety of cross-sector stakeholders to accomplish a sustained collective impact goal.

**Collections Stewardship:** IMLS supports the exemplary management, care, and conservation of, as well as broad access to and use of museum collections. Investments designed to contribute to the long-term preservation of materials and specimens are complemented by skill-building and capacity-expanding programs for museum staff, volunteers, and interns. IMLS welcomes applications for projects that address state-of-the-art collections care and collections-information management, curation, preventive conservation, conservation treatments, database creation and enhancement, digitization, and the use of digital tools to facilitate discovery and deepen engagement with museum collections.

The purpose of this program is to support the independence and well-being of tribal elders living in their communities with services that are evidence-based and consistent with locally determined needs. The

program will provide funding through Part A: Grants for Native Americans/Alaska Natives Programs; Part B: Grants for Native Hawaiian Programs; and Part C: Grants for the Native American Caregiver Support Program, available to American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians. Applicants that submit applications for both Part A and Part B may also receive funding for Part C.

Part A and Part B projects must include the following elements: Nutrition services, Information and assistance services, other supportive services, as outlined on page 6 of the NOFA file, and Coordination with Title III

Projects also funded through Part C must include the following caregiver services: Dissemination of information, Assistance to caregiving in gaining access, Individual counseling, organization of support groups, and training to caregivers, Respite care to enable caregivers to temporarily be relieved from their responsibilities and Supplemental services,

**7. Arizona Veterans' Donation Fund - Deadline December 15, 2016 (Grant opportunity for general use)**

The Arizona Veterans' Donation Fund, established in 1999 by the Arizona legislature, has helped fund programs that benefit veterans and their families throughout Arizona. Arizona State law specifies that tax-deductible donations to, and monies held in, this account can never revert to the State General Fund. The assets held in the account can only be used to benefit veterans in the State of Arizona through small grants and large grants, each with their own documented application process. In fiscal year 2013, for example, the Arizona Veterans' Donation Fund awarded over \$725,000 to veterans' programs and initiatives throughout the State. Proposals will be accepted from October 15, 2016 through December 15, 2016.

15. ASU Veterans Upward Bound: Preparing Vets for Success

The Veterans Upward Bound Project (VUB) at Arizona State University (ASU) is a federally funded educational program that serves veterans who are either low-income or potential first-generation college students. Veterans Upward Bound's mission is to motivate and assist veterans as they pursue higher education. The goal of VUB is to improve veterans' academic skills by providing FREE courses in English (composition & literature), mathematics (basic math to precalculus), computer literacy, laboratory science, foreign language and college planning (including financial literacy & career guidance) in order to enroll in and earn a postsecondary degree at the educational institution of their choice.

Message to Veterans: Arizona State University is extremely proud of its academic excellence. Our open-entry and open-exit program allows you to start at the earliest date possible and to finish as soon as you reach the skill levels required for your program. In addition to our classroom instruction we assist you with the application process for admissions and financial aid to a postsecondary program. While we hope that you give our ASU programs your serious consideration, we do remind you that you are free to select any given program at the school of your choice.

There is no monetary expense for the veteran who qualifies to enroll in our program. The only real expenditure is in the form of time and effort. Our staff members believe that our veterans are capable of reaching whatever academic goals they may choose. We have all heard that "the longest journey begins with the first step". We sincerely hope that you will take advantage of our program and allow us to be of assistance in your journey.
